Maths News

YEAR 8 MATHS UPDATE

The Year 8 Maths team is excited to share the School Specific Data report which we have received from Maths Pathway about the success of the program at SMOTA. The report included a summary of the state of maths learning within our Year 8 cohort for Semester One, 2017.

Within the Maths Pathway program, the expected growth for each student per year is described as 1.00 (i.e. 1.00 growth is equal to one year's learning). The report which we received shows that, on average, the growth rate of Year 8 students at SMOTA is 1.55. This growth data is very promising as it indicates that the average rate of student learning in Year 8 Maths is above the expected goal.

Our Year 8 Maths teaching team (consisting of Ruth Bakogianis, Alison Dietrich and Rose Nihill) are very pleased as the report shows that the vast majority of Year 8 students are experiencing success in mathematics. The Maths Pathway program assists us to offer lessons that are tailored to precisely what each individual student is ready to learn. These lessons might involve filling in gaps in prior learning, or working on extension activities. All lessons are based entirely on teaching at the point of need for each individual. The program has also provided an excellent platform from which we can focus on the development of the independent and self-directed learning strategies that each student is ready for.

The 'Premiere' program is the largest global performing arts program of its kind with over 75,000 young people from 13 countries auditioning to be a part of the program in 2016 alone.

Out of those 75,000 who auditioned, Ella and Kian were among 500 chosen to take part in the Orlando showcase. Selected performers had the opportunity to audition for dozens of top agents, managers, casting directors and record labels for real up and coming projects as well as work with celebrities from popular kids networks.

From the audition processes in Orlando, Ella received 3 call backs and Kian received 6 which is a phenomenal effort for both of them.

Ella said, "It was an amazing experience. This is the only program in the world that children can audition and perform in front of agents and casting managers directly.

"When we arrived in America the journey began straight away. After all of the performances, we were called into a room to share our resumes and headshots and also to be asked questions or pick up a direct call back."

Ella said from here they'll continue to work with the agents they met and follow up on the call backs they received and who knows, maybe in a few years time these two might be Australia's newest celebrity exports direct from Nathalia.

CONFRONTING YOUTH HOMELESSNESS

Our SMOTA students stepped out of their comfort zones donning pyjamas at school on Friday in an effort to raise funds for youth homelessness.

The day was an initiative of VCAL students, Sina Ventre and Olivia Cline who along with their class mates, aim to purchase a number of swags from money raised on the day to donate to the Salvation Army in Melbourne next week.

Olivia said, "We had a group discussion in class and after watching a documentary called 'Filthy Rich and Homeless' we thought we'd like to do something to help."

Students have been learning about the causes, effects and stereotypes of youth homelessness to help foster a greater understanding of the issue.

Currently 42% of people experiencing homelessness are under 24 years old and 17,845 are children under 12. The largest cause of homelessness in Australia is domestic and family violence and from 2014 to 2015 alone, 255,657 people accessed homelessness support services and nearly 7 million nights of accommodation were provided by homelessness services. Every little bit of help counts.


Last week on Wednesday 30th August, the Vet Hospitality class catered for the Catholic Women's League's 80th year celebration.



We practiced our turns and soon moved from green runs to blue, remembering of course that stopping was important too (cough Cooper Beitzel).


We all had a blast and became sad that the good times couldn't last!

The kit contained a range of games people will be familiar with if they grew up in the 1920s - 1950s, a selection of rhymes and riddles from that period and some terrific old photos.

Small groups of students joined the two Johns, Joy, Margaret and Carol. After introductions, the guests shared their stories of the past prompted by a series of thoughtful and incisive questions from the students, who showed a genuine interest in the information being provided. 'Old fashioned' games were explained and played with our 21st century students marvelling at the resourcefulness and initiative shown by their predecessors. Spinning tops, jacks, elastics, pick up sticks, Meccano, various card games, dominoes, peg dolls, tin aeroplanes, marbles and simple pieces of string and wool were all investigated. More importantly, whilst the games were being played, valuable conversations were taking place, unscripted, with the sharing of fond childhood memories from both our current students and the guests. Students were also impressed with Carol Byrnes' mastery of the spoons as she belted out a jaunty accompaniment to 'The Road to Gundagai'.

It was then our student's turn to introduce some of their 'modern' day games, that are heavily reliant on technology, to their guests. The great discovery here (as revealed by one of our guests) is that, in reality, the gap between their and the current generation is minimal. What is the difference between playing 'Call of Duty' and Cowboys and Indians? All kids want to relax, explore and escape into imaginary worlds. The pursuit of fun and adventure is timeless.
