# Deputy Principal's News

## **Deputy Principal - Catholic Identity**

Spiritual experiences will affect people in different ways. Your reaction could be informed by age, background, mood or level of expectation. For me, the feeling after our St Mary of the Angels College Opening Mass was a mixture of relief, joy and gratitude for being able to work with some of the most dedicated, insightful, committed and talented folks going around. I felt the presence of Jesus Christ in working with these people and I look forward to doing it all again soon. The Catholic calendar moves fast at this time of year from Opening Mass straight into Lent.

Ash Wednesday (15th February) marked the start of Lent for us here at the College. This is an important time for those in the Catholic community as we turn to God for enlightenment and purification.

On Tuesday of this week we celebrated Shrove Tuesday with the traditional feast of pancakes. This feast was contrasted the following day as our preparation for the coming of Easter began with fasting, prayer and a commitment to generous giving.

The practice of Catholic communities being blessed with a cross of ashes on the forehead symbolises humility as well as cleansing. We then take this sign as a reminder to ask for God's forgiveness in the shortcomings of our own lives. This is a powerful invitation, as we all need the time to reflect on where our lives may be lacking judgment or right relationship. With prayer and fasting we consciously strive for a healthier and more positive relationship with our faith, our families, our communities and ourselves. I urge everyone in our College community to consider 'giving up' or 'taking up' something from now until Easter.

Challenge yourself and deny yourself some of the first world luxuries that we so often take for granted. Phones, laptops, cars, televisions, internet and social media all come to mind (even if you only give them up for a period of the day- after 7pm for example).

Perhaps you could extend yourself and commit to doing something positive for the betterment of others. A kind word, a greeting to someone outside your peer group, volunteering at your local church or generously giving to those in need. The impact you can make with a small gesture is powerful. In Lent as in life, we will get out of it what we are prepared to put into it.

I wish you well for your Lenten journey and pray that it starts with deep discernment and a desire for action.

## Project Compassion

Lent began on Ash Wednesday which also marks the beginning of 'Project Compassion' a major fundraiser for Caritas Australia.

Caritas Australia is part of a global network which spans over 200 countries and territories. For over 110 years, Caritas has worked towards the creation of a just world. In 1964, Caritas began in Australia. A Catholic Agency for International Aid and Development, Caritas is Latin for love and compassion – two qualities which are central to our work.

Shrove Tuesday, that day that precedes Ash Wednesday, was also marked with the cooking of delicious pancakes a combined effort of the SRC and Social Justice students. The stall at school sold out of pancakes at recess while our Social Justice team cooked pancakes outside TJ's IGA Supermarket raising \$185 from public donations.

The SRC and Social Justice group collectively raised \$366.75 which is a great start to our Project Compassion fundraising.

This year's social justice project compassion initiative is named 'Goatitas'.

Over the Project Compassion period, for every \$50 the homeroom raises they will receive a cut-out goat; this represents the worth of a goat in a disadvantaged country. Money raised during project compassion 'Goatitas' will help fund programs such as the purchase of goats and livestock, agricultural training and give communities the opportunities to build a stable income.

Raising awareness of the plight of some of our poorest neighbours will be an important focus of Project compassion at St Mary of the Angels as well as fundraising. We ask that everyone gets involved to continue our College's reputation as a big supporter of Caritas.

We only have six weeks left so start rounding up your 'Goatitas' dollars!

## EXTRA-CURRICULA ACTIVITIES

## ASSESSMENT AND REPORTING

St Mary of the Angels has traditionally reported on assessment tasks with an A to E grade scale. Increasingly, however, some tasks at Years 7 to 10 will be assessed to VCAA achievement levels. Our teachers are progressively developing assessment rubrics which are constructed with multiple levels of achievement so that each individual student is encouraged to work, and progress, from the level at which they are currently working. Assessment tasks based on achievement standards for each level will not be assigned a grade, but will rather be assigned the overall level of achievement that the student has demonstrated. As we work through the 2018 academic year, you may find that your child's achievement on some assessments are reported as grades, and some to VCAA levels.

### Reporting to achievement levels allows for:

- a more rigorous, personalised approach to learning for all students
- a focus on celebrating learning growth regardless of the level at which a student may be working
- greater student involvement in their own learning as the next step in their learning progress is visible.

For each year level, there are age-expected levels at which the average student is expected to achieve, as listed below. More importantly though, all students should be rewarded for achieving learning growth, particularly celebrating when they achieve more than the minimum expected one year of growth for one year of schooling.

**Food:** Students can bring their own lunch if they wish. The Pool staff will be running a BBQ on the day and their canteen will be open to purchase items.


Food and drinks will be available for parents at the hospitality tent.
