Our Bus Drivers

St Mary of the Angels has one of the biggest school owned and operated bus systems in Victoria. Our current fleet of nine active buses travels over 30,000kms a month. Presently over 80% of the school's students are travelling via the bus system to attend St Mary of the Angels. The drivers are the first and last contact these students have with the College on a daily basis. The drivers appreciate the help they receive from the bus captains in maintaining order on the buses. This 'classroom on wheels' has a maximum class size of fifty-seven and a class time which in some cases lasts an hour and a half, morning and night.

Drivers employed by St Mary of the Angels are required to satisfy the requirements of the Taxi Services Commission of Victoria and be issued with a Driver's Certificate. Stringent regulations require drivers to undergo licence history checks and full medicals.

Our current group of thirteen drivers come with a diverse range of working experience and a broad knowledge base. They are dedicated, well trained and a pleasure with whom to work.

The drivers occasionally have to make on the spot decisions regarding breakdowns, road work detours, and health emergencies. Drivers have early starts in all weather conditions and this requires safely negotiating up to twenty bus stops in foggy conditions. Constant concentration and skill are paramount. First and foremost in the driver's minds is the safety and wellbeing of the students in their care. They are aware that delays affect the bus timetable and a great number of other people.

Our job is very rewarding and drivers are a part of a student's journey from their first day in Year 7 to saying good-bye on their last day in Year 12. One Year 12 student recently summed it up on a Thank You card to a driver – 'Thank you for being the best driver ever! I appreciate the kindness you gave me especially on my very first frightful week of high school. You were a great friend and I will miss our bus chats'.

I take this opportunity to thank our drivers for the great work they do each day transporting our students and look forward to the remainder of the 2018 school year.



SMOTA Beanies on Sale Now!



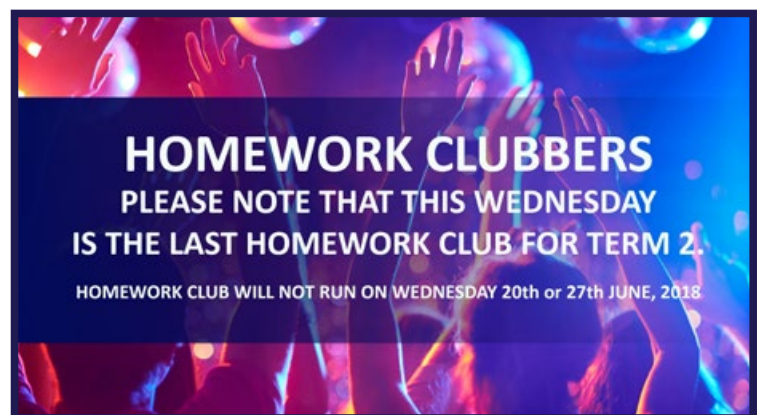

I was listening to a great song last week called *Reckless Love* by Cory Asbury, an American Christian singer-songwriter. The melody continues to circle in my head and I find myself walking around singing the chorus under my breath unconsciously. More brilliant than the hooks and harmonies however, is the line:

"Oh, the overwhelming, never-ending, reckless love of God

Oh, it chases me down, fights 'til I'm found, leaves the ninety-nine I couldn't earn it, and I don't deserve it, still, You give Yourself away..."

The parable of the lost sheep is recorded in both the Gospels of Matthew and Luke and tells of a shepherd who has a flock of one hundred sheep. One of the flock has gone missing however, Jesus asks his disciples the question, *What will the shepherd do? Will he leave the ninety-nine in the wilderness and search for the one, or will he forget the one and call him a lost cause?*

What would you do? Do you ensure the safety of the group or do you risk it all for the least of them? God would have us search out the one and rejoice in the coming home of the lost sinner who returns to God. This message is echoed in the homecoming of the Prodigal Son and can challenge our thinking. We might be inclined to pour our love on the ones that do as they are told, but there is victory in those who stray and with guidance come back to the flock. We may even be the one who is in need of finding and we hope that someone will care enough to find us. The shepherd is seen as a failure if he is not prepared to go out of his way to ensure the safety of all those in his care.

EXAMS AND SEMESTER REPORTS

Congratulations to our Year 10 and Year 11 students who participated in subject exams this week. The response of our students who participated to the fullness of their ability is a credit to their maturity and desire to do their best. Students should now look to receive feedback from teachers so as to improve both their use of the pre-exam study period and how to better engage and respond in the exam situation. The exam period is important not only to provide an indication of a student's developing skills, but to impart valuable experience in the exam situation before the external Unit 3/4 exams and other assessments that students may meet in their respective pathways after secondary school.

All Year 7 to 12 students should now be finalising assessments prior to end-of-semester reports. A reminder that Friday 22nd June is a student free day as teachers complete corrections and data entry for reports. Semester reports will be released to parents at the beginning of Term 3 after which Learning Advisors will be in touch to ensure that your child is happy at school and on track to achieving their best. At all times, parents are most welcome to contact Learning Advisors with any questions or concerns regarding your child's progress.

SEMESTER TWO SUBJECT CHANGES

Semester 2 for Year 10, 11 and 12 students will begin on Monday 18th June (after Exam Week). Semester 2 for all Year 7, 8, and 9 students will begin at the start of Term 3.

Any student who wishes to change a VCE subject should collect the appropriate form from Mrs Thorp. Subject change forms will be accepted from the 12th June until the end of term so that all students will be in their new subjects by the beginning of Term 3. At all times, we encourage discussion between the student and the teachers concerned, our Pathways staff and parents/guardians to ensure that each student is making the best choices for his/her future pathways.

It should be noted that subject changes will only be permitted where class sizes allow. All students are more than welcome to discuss their subject selections with myself or other staff at any time.

FRANCISCAN STUDENT LEADERSHIP PROGRAM 2018



As a Franciscan school, St Mary of the Angels College embraces the teachings and charism of St Francis of Assisi. St Francis was a leader of his time and even today his leadership qualities are still relevant.

In Mark's Gospel, Jesus said "whoever wishes to be the greatest among you must be the least" and "I came not to be served, but to serve." St. Francis showed this servant attitude of Christ in his own life, serving others in a spirit of caring and compassion. Both Jesus and Francis show us that leaders are to be servants to those they lead, putting what is good for others ahead of themselves. Being a leader is not easy, and even Francis had to learn some skills to help him become an effective leader of his group of friars.

So what made St Francis of Assisi a leader?

- Francis led by example, caring for the poor and needy.
- Francis attracted many followers by living simply, preaching the message of Jesus, and caring for the poor. As a result, the wealth of some priests and bishops began to be condemned.
- Francis attempted to end the violence of the Crusades by traveling to Egypt and converting the Sultan. He spoke out against violence often.
- The Franciscan order founded by Francis includes the Friars Minor, the Capuchins, and the Grey Friars. He also inspired the formation of several others including the Poor Clare's for women and a lay order for non-religious people.
- He organized and provided structure for these new religious groups, guiding them and leaving rules for them to follow after he was gone.

What will the program provide?

The Franciscan Student Leadership Program is an opportunity for students in Years 10 & 11 at St Mary of the Angels to strengthen their leadership skills and seek to build on their leadership potential with the opportunity to make a tangible difference to our College and the local community, just as St Francis did.

Students will be exposed to leadership styles, areas of strength, meeting processes and protocols whilst building their capacity to be a leader in a variety of settings. They will also have the opportunity to learn from other dedicated leaders, both from inside and outside the College, in order to further embrace the positives as well as the challenges faced with leadership.

During the program students will be encouraged to step outside their comfort zones and become involved in new and different activities, including public speaking, running meetings and learning how to be a good ambassador. Their journey will provide them with a strong insight, not only into the College and the wider community, but also themselves through the personal reflection.

In alignment with our graduate aspirations, we hope to drive our students to be visionary thinkers who are passionate about leadership, empowered to take risks as well as be compassionate, empathetic and accepting individuals who are willing to make a difference.

Congratulations to the students pictured left and above, who achieved an outstanding result of 200% or more in cycle 7.

The growth rate is a really important part of the Year 8 Maths Pathway program; as it emphasises the value of continual development. A student's growth rate reflects the new work that they've mastered over a two week period.

Growth rates are based entirely on the number of modules (or exercises) that a student masters on a test. For example $100\% = 3$ modules mastered, $133\% = 4$ modules mastered.
